# Wastewater Treatment Facility Stack Filter Update

The Wastewater Treatment Facility (WWTF) is working on an upgrade to the Stack Filters and Final Clarifiers. The stack filters provide most of the wastewater treatment. They are filled with 11 layers of synthetic media, 20 feet deep, that provide a large surface area for the growth of aerobic bacteria as part of the secondary treatment process. The first picture below shows the West stack filter at the beginning of demo with the old media still intact. The second picture shows new media being installed. This project is anticipated to be complete by the end of 2026.

# Community Solar Garden Production

The sun is shining and our solar garden is producing! The Community Solar Garden went live in the middle of December and has expectedly seen a significant increase in production as we enter into summer. **Why does production increase in the summer?** 


Daylight hours are longer.




The sun is higher in the sky causing more direct sunlight to the panels.

One of the benefits of a solar garden are that the panels have been installed with optimal placement. Additionally, the panels are programmed to shift direction as the sun shifts, which helps alleviate snow accumulation in the winter and capitalize on the sunshine during the daylight.




### Sprinkling Forgiveness

The Sprinkling Forgiveness Program is in effect from now until October. During these months, you will pay for the water that you use, including water used for sprinkling, but your sewer usage charge on your bill is capped at your winter usage. This is in place to accurately charge customers for their sewer usage even when water usage is inflated due to summer irrigation. Regularly evaluate how long each zone is watering. If water begins to pool, turn off your sprinkler to prevent overwatering and runoff.




#### Diggers Hotline

Digging into utility lines, can be incredibly dangerous and destructive resulting in injuries and/or added costs. ## Summer Energy Conservation Tips

As the weather warms up, your electric usage may increase causing a higher utility bill, but there are steps you can take to help maintain lower usage.



Install window coverings to prevent heat gain through your windows during the day.



Set your thermostat at a temperature you find comfortable and that provides humidity control, if needed. The smaller the difference between the indoor and outdoor temperatures, the lower your overall cooling bill will be. Get your a/c unit tuned-up for maximum operations.



Turn off ceiling fans when you leave the room. Fans cool people, not rooms, by creating a wind chill effect.
